adek (Marek) Porembski - a fixture in Mallory Square, Key West, FL.- will present his original bamboo artwork at the next meeting of the FCC/ABS Feb. 21 at 2:00 PM at Fairchild Tropical Garden, Miami. Madek will discuss and demonstrate techniques he uses to create unique items from bamboo. He is an island native of beautiful Key West. His designs

reflect the tropical island surroundings of Key West and have a definite mystical influence inspired by Australia Aboriginal tribal art and indigenous ritual all people on the planet. Madek's work in bamboo began with the making of didgeridoos. From this initial project sprang drums, flutes, incense burners, pipes and fountains, all made from the unused bamboo scraps. Marcotting bamboo—an often ignored propagation method

am often asked questions about propagation of tropical bamboo species and, occasionally, someone asks about airlayering. The procedure I use (marcotting) involves growing new roots on a small unwounded branch that is still attached to a tree. Air-layering requires that a wound is made to a branch or stem of a plant and the wound is wrapped in rooting medium until roots form.

It is not often easy to encourage root formation from the nodes of happily-growing, uncut bamboo culms. I don't waste time arbitrarily wrapping nodes on every clump in the nursery. I do, however, keep a lookout for any 'volunteer' roots forming at the branch bases. As I walk down the rows of bamboo, especially after periods of heavy rain, it's not unusually to see what I call caterpillar feet—little white roots— where the branches meet the culm. Within a few days, these root tips will dry up so the window of opportunity is small. I simply wrap the entire node with a propagation medium contained by polyethylene film. Sometimes, an irrigation drip line is secured to ensure the medium stays moist. After three or four weeks, the assembly is unwrapped and the branch/root cluster is severed from the culm. These are potted up and, depending on the amount of developed roots, the success rate is extremely high.
